



## A reflection from the Pastor

"Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her," Jesus speaking to the scribes and Pharisees about the woman caught in adultery in today's gospel. As we have seen this Lent, sin has a definite social dimension – it not only effects us (the sinner), but it also effects others. The woman caught in adultery was to be stoned to death according to the law – but Jesus in a single instant says that we should look at ourselves before judging a sinner—for they have already been judged by the sin itself. Often we forget that there is still a person behind the sin – we only see the sin. This week we will once again be invited to look beyond the appearances – the jeers, taunts, betrayals, denials, etc. – and look to Jesus, who through one selfless act of death on the cross was able to overcome all sin. Now, that is something to reflect on when we get caught up in condemning the sinner, rather than the sin. Otherwise, we too become subject to the same condemnation.

I hope you all had a good spring break and that you have adjusted to the time change. Thank you to all who made the St. Patrick's Day Pot Luck Supper a success. The food, those who attended in parish fellowship and effort, really meant a lot for me as a priest and pastor on our feast day.

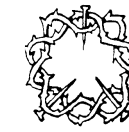

### Holy Week – March 29 – April 2

During Holy Week we walk with Jesus, we suffer with him, and finally, we rise again, new creatures. We don't just watch in these days, we participate in them so that we might strive to be more like Christ.

#### Monday of Holy Week

- Gospel reading at Mass on this day: The Anointing at Bethany. Mary of Bethany, sister of Martha and Lazarus, anoints Jesus, a sign of his suffering and death and his identity as the Messiah and Chosen One – the Christ.
- As Jesus prepares for the sacrifice ahead, we too are invited to prepare more deeply.

#### Tuesday of Holy Week

In our diocese, the Chrism Mass takes place, which is normally on the morning of Holy Thursday.

#### The Chrism Mass

This a diocesan wide celebration, in which all the priests gather with the bishop to renew their priestly dedication. The three different oils to be used in the sacraments are bless/consecrated by the bishop and given to the pastors:

Oil of the Sick, Oil of Catechumens are blessed. The Sacred Chrism is consecrated; it is used in baptisms, confirmations, and Holy Orders.

#### Wednesday of Holy Week

The gospel recounts Jesus' instructions on the need of the disciples to prepare a place for the Last Supper. Today is a good time to center and prepare our own "inner" rooms for the next days.

#### Sacred Triduum

The three days that changed the world – the liturgies from Holy Thursday evening through the evening of Easter Sunday. We share in the mystery of Christ's life, death, and resurrection, and we meet and follow.

#### Holy Thursday

The single evening Mass recalls Jesus institution of the Eucharist and includes the Mandatum ceremony of the washing of feet. This comes from John 13:34 in which Jesus encourages the disciples to wash one another's feet out of love. The celebration ends with a procession to reserve the Eucharist for adoration for a suitable time.

#### Good Friday

The service of the Lord's Passion recalls how Jesus died for us on the cross. Mass is not celebrated on this day, but at 3:00 a service of the Passion and Communion is held. The readings are drawn from Isaiah, Hebrews, and John's Gospel Passion account. The cross is venerated by all. In our parish, the stations of the cross is walked in the morning from Placedo to St. Patrick's as a sign of our willingness to enter more fully into the passion of our Lord. Spending time in prayer between the hours of noon and three o'clock is a good way of joining yourself to Jesus' suffering. It is a day of fast and abstinence from meat in the church.
